Dear Parishioners,

We celebrate today the Third Sunday of Lent. As we continue with our journey with Jesus during this blessed season let us use our sense of imagination and have a mental picture of the City of Jerusalem at Jesus' time at the Passover celebration. During those times the activities of the Temple were the year's major events, religiously, culturally, and economically, for Israel and particularly for Jerusalem. Jews came to Jerusalem from all over the world at Passover. A Jewish historian could be exaggerating when he says over 250,000 Passover victims, like oxen, sheep and doves were sacrificed during Passover. But for sure the figures ran into many thousands. The Law required that the animals for sacrifice be perfect. Since people came from distant places, and it would have been burdensome to bring an animal with them, it was expedient that the huge number of animals be sold in Jerusalem. With only one particular place to buy what they needed, they could not get any bargains. Are we getting a picture of something like a county fair with people packed together coming and going, moving along with animals like sheep and doves in birdcages. On top of all this were the moneychangers.

The law required that people purchase their sacrifice with Jewish currency. Roman coins were considered idolatrous because they were engraved with pagan inscriptions and images. Since the Jews were under Roman occupation, they probably had to use Roman currency in their everyday lives. So when people came to buy an animal for sacrifice, they had to exchange their foreign currency for Jewish currency. Thus we have the moneychangers.

Aside from cheating or dishonesty, there were those who were getting quite wealthy in the name of God. Jesus told the Jewish leaders who challenged him for doing what he did: "you have made the temple a den of thieves." We might be surprised why Jesus reacted so violently in this instance. We see him nowhere else in the Scriptures expressing such anger. Quite possibly he was angry at seeing how poor people coming to worship were being ripped off. The Gospel gives us another reason too for his irate behavior as he recalled the psalm verse: "Zeal for your house will consume me." Noticeably he placed worship of God much more highly than most people do. We all know how easy it is to become careless in our reverence and devotion to our Heavenly Father. Often times God is put in second place, or even further down in our list of values. It was not that way with Jesus. His Heavenly Father always took first place with him. The readings for this Sunday, most particularly the Gospel which is about the cleansing of the temple might prompt us to examine and reflect on our relationship with God. We call upon him and ask with all honesty: Do our lives show that we believe what we say? Jesus is challenging us to change, and cleansing our lives.

World Meeting of Families March Theme: Creating the Future
