


### FROM THE PASTOR

### Dear Parishioners,

Following the recommendation of Bishop O'O Connell, as well as it is the month of October, we are invited to pray the rosary every day not only for our personal and private devotion but most importantly, during this difficult and challenging times as we call and seek the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary to help and protect us from all sickness of the body, mind, and spirit. Allow me to share with you a brief story and reflection of Our Lady of the Rosary.

It was St. Pius V, who established this feast in 1573. The main intention was to thank God for the victory of Christians over the Turks at Lepanto. A victory attributed to the praying of the rosary. Pope Clement XI extended the feast to the universal Church in 1716. The development of the rosary has a long history. In the beginning, a practice developed of praying 150 Psalms. Then there was a parallel practice of praying 150 Hail Mary's. Soon a mystery of Jesus' life was attached to each Hail Mary. Mary's giving of the rosary to St. Dominic is recognized as a legend. The development of this form of prayer owes much to the followers of St. Dominic Alan de la Roche, who founded the first Confraternity of the Rosary in the 15th century. In the 16th century, the rosary was developed from the 15 mysteries: joyful, sorrowful, and glorious. In 2002, Pope John Paul 11 added five Mysteries of Light to this great devotion.

The main purpose of the rosary is to help us meditate on the great mysteries of our redemption. Pius XII called it a compendium of the gospel. The focus is on Jesus, his birth, life, death, and resurrection. Our fathers remind us that Jesus's Father is the initiator of salvation. The Hail Mary reminds us to join with Mary in contemplating these mysteries. They also make us aware that Mary was and is intimately joined with her Son in all the mysteries of his earthly and heavenly existence. The Glory Bes remind us that the purpose of all life is the glory of the Trinity.

As we can see, the rosary appeals to many. It is simple. The constant repetition of words helps create an atmosphere in which to contemplate the mysteries of God. We sense that Jesus and Mary are with us in the joys and sorrows of life. We grow in the hope that God will bring us to share in the glory of Jesus and Mary forever.

### TWENTY SEVENTH SUNDAY IN THE ORDINARY TIME

Let us keep in mind that Jesus, in His parables, uses the life experience of the people to teach them about the kingdom of God and about the relationships that we need to develop if our lives are to reach their ultimate fulfillment in the kingdom of heaven. It is quite noticeable that the stories relate to what the people know about life at home, such as farming, fishing, building, and how to make these things work for the common good. They are examples that even today relate to life as we know it. In our Gospel today, the setting is the vineyard, with tenants employed to manage it. Having been left with the responsibility, these tenants begin to think of it as "their" vineyard, and when the time comes to produce the harvest for the owner, they resent it. They beat up and kill the owner's representatives, including his own son. Jesus reminds the chief priests and elders of the prophecy of Isaiah in today's reading. God is the creator of the vineyard, God's own people, on whom God spent a great deal of love and attention but has not received the expected harvest. Jesus develops this image, focusing on those responsible for the care of this vineyard, the priests, and the elders. They have begun to think of the people as their own possession, and so reject the message of the emissaries of God, the prophets. Now is the time for the final act, where they reject the Son, Jesus, and are about to kill him.

So, the question is, what has all this to do with us in this present age? Certainly, we are all responsible citizens of this planet. Each one of us has cared for everyone else and our "common home." We are all workers in the vineyard of the Lord. This is not something exclusively for Church leaders alone, but all of us. It is not something that relates only to religious stuff, but to everything and everybody who shares this planet with us. It is all about making the world the venue God wants it to be.

As we can see over the past centuries, there have been movements of conquest and colonization, which led to the enslavement and oppression of millions and thousands of people. Many wars of liberation have been transformations and changes in culture as human beings have learned the ways of international cooperation and peace. Nevertheless, there are continuing examples of violence and war all around the world. Significantly, the word of God provides us with a vision of a world at peace where kingdoms and people gather as ONE to worship and praise the One true God and Lord of all. As God's people, our vital role is to witness the possibility of such a reality to produce the good fruits of God's vineyard. Jesus came to us to reinforce this peace and reconciliation message and sent out his disciples to demonstrate a new way of living together. There is no place in God's world for violent oppression and exploitation of others. Jesus' death and resurrection are God's answer to selfishness and greed. Hence, as Jesus' disciples of today in his Church, you and I are responsible for producing the harvest's fruits. Amen.

### Inspiration for the week



Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen.


