FROM THE DESK OF THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

My friends in Christ, please allow me to share with you a beautiful story. Once a poor villager came to a town to earn money for the Passover. On his return journey to the village after nightfall, laden with purchases, his horse and wagon fell into a pit made swampy by the spring rains. A rich man, passing by, heard his cries and, with his driver's help, extricated the villager. He roped the latter's wagon to his carriage and accompanied the poor villager to his hut. On beholding the abject poverty in which the villager and his family lived, the magnate gave him a large amount of money.

The wealthy man died and was brought to the heavenly court. It seemed his demerits because of specific business dealings would result in a sentence of eternal punishment. Suddenly an angel of mercy appeared and asked that the heavenly scales be used to determine whether the worth of his good deeds outweigh his sins. When consent was given, the angel placed in the scale the good deeds of the poor villager and his family whom the rich man had saved from misery. But this did not suffice. The horse and wagon were added, but these did not help much. Then the angel placed on the scale the mud and mire out of which the rich man had helped rescue the villager, and lo, the scale of good deeds dipped with the weight, and the magnate was saved from eternal punishment.

Salvation takes place when the mercy of God meets the misery of man. Salvation comes from God. Since God became man in Jesus, salvation is God in Jesus. In Jesus, God is compassionate. He is sympathizing, suffering with man. How could God truly suffer with man, if God is not Emmanuel, God with us? And how could man unmistakably know that God not only is with man but suffers with him without God becoming man in Jesus and without Jesus suffering and dying for man?

The healing of the man with leprosy in the Gospel is just one instance of the mystery of salvation taking place through Jesus Christ, only one more illustration of God proving that He is mercy and love. In flesh and blood. Jesus in flesh and blood is tangible and palpable, is more than what the senses can register and master. He is more than what He is visibly: the son of man. Primarily and principally, he is the Son of God. And that is invisible. In the case of the man with leprosy also, our senses fail to grasp the situation's full extent. In the healing of the leper, we see the divine compassion of the Lord for suffering humanity. Out of compassion and love for the race, He became man, fought the evil of suffering and sickness, and finally conquered it by His suffering and death. In His infinite love for humankind, He placed heaven and a share in the life of God within our reach. We are always in need of His mercy because we are inclined to sin, and often we do sin. Beloved Jesus, source of compassionate healing, we ask you to make us whole in body and spirit, so that we might offer ourselves as a worthy gift to God. Amen.

ASH WEDNESDAY

February 17 marks the liturgical season of penance in preparation for Easter. Kindly take a moment to look at our Masses and services schedule in the Bulletin and on the website. During the 40 days that begin with Ash Wednesday and conclude on Holy Thursday, we are all encouraged to engage in penitential acts of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. To heighten our spiritual life and draw us closer to God. Though most often associated with the avoidance of food and drink, fasting can be voluntary avoidance of anything valued and enjoyed. And it is a very personal matter. The two obligatory food fast during Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On those days, persons between the ages of 18 and 59 should have only one full meal, though smaller amounts of food may be taken in the morning and at noon. Everyone 14 years of age and older is to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all Fridays during Lent.

Our usual practice of having the Stations of the Cross during the Fridays of Lent starts this Friday, February 19 at 6 PM in the Church. Since we are still in the midst of the public health crisis, COVID 19, we won't have the hospitality as we have before. Please follow all the protocols and directives mandated to us by the Diocese and the government. We encourage you to be fully aware that the virus is still with us and, therefore, not let our guards down, so please cooperate and be with us to keep everyone safe and healthy.

This weekend is ACA SUNDAY kick-off. Instead of having the sermons delivered in the Masses, let us allow the Bishop to speak and address to us all about the appeal through the video. As your Pastor, I will say a few words as we support and pray for the appeal's success. The goal that was assigned to us is 40 thousand dollars. We count on your generosity and kindness.






Inspiration for the week

Lenten Disciplines of Fasting & Abstinence

Catholics in good health ages 18 to 59 are required to fast and to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting consists of eating only one meal, with the possibility of two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal.

Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.

Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/ Letters of Eligibility

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

A sponsor must be registered at St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but now lives elsewhere</u>, <u>he/she is not a member of this parish</u>. Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in <u>whose territory he/she resides</u>. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.


