


FROM THE DESK OF THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

Being a leader or the one in charge of any agency or department during these trying and unprecedented times is a huge challenge and arduous responsibility. Since we reopened the Church for worship, prayer, and service to our faithful parishioners in June, little by little, we made a lot of adaptations and changes according to the best advice from experts. We thank our parish personnel, volunteers, and generous parishioners for providing us with the necessary help and support as we are happy in serving our faithful people. Similarly, a big word of thanks to all who understand why we adhere to these protocols and to those who are supportive and cooperative, we truly appreciate you, thank you kindly.

Following Diocesan directives and government protocols mandated by CDC, the parish community seeks to be creative and innovative. As we have previously announced, there will be a minor change within the Mass starting this weekend. Keep in mind the virus continues its devastation, so we have to be vigilant and extremely careful. Based upon our observation on what is going on in many Churches to avoid the spread of the virus, we will distribute Holy Communion after the final blessing in the Narthex. The faithful will then leave Church immediately after the reception of the Sacrament. We expect your collaboration as we work together to keep everybody healthy and safe.

FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

Allow me to share a true story of a psychiatrist who was famous for his work on schizophrenia. Once his students at his hospital came upon a person with schizophrenia who had deteriorated so far that they could not get a response. They called the Doctor, and while he was in the patient's room, they waited outside, gloating in advance over what would surely be the great professor's failure. After about 20 minutes, the door opened, and the professor and the patient walked out arm in arm, tears streaming down the sick man's face. He had experienced a genuine emotional response and a catharsis. The dumbfounded students asked the Doctor by what scientific method he had succeeded. "I cried a little, and he cried a little, and that's how it happened," replied the Doctor.

The Catholic Church throughout the world commemorates the penitential season of Lent. Jesus is the Son of God. Jesus is the Holy One. How can the Holy One, the Son of God, be tempted? The temptation of Jesus is mind-boggling. What sense can we make of it? Who can forgive sins? The obvious answer is God alone. Jesus is God, and so He forgives sins. This places Jesus at an opposite, distant pole from humanity. Yet today, we have Jesus—one with us. These two truths of faith are essential to understand the mystery of Jesus—God and Man.

Jesus' power to forgive sins and His radical solidarity with humanity are two critical dimensions of Jesus. As the Savior, precisely Jesus, is the fittest, so to speak, to meet adequately, and more than enough, man's needs to be man's Savior. Man is a sinner. A sinner needs forgiveness, and only God can forgive sins. Hence we perceive the divine nature of Jesus. But Jesus is not an unachievable Savior. Forgiveness of sin is not a mere cancellation ritual. Jesus became human, human-like us in everything except sin. "He Himself was tempted and suffered." (Heb. 2:18). Jesus became one with humanity; He descended to save. His temptation is a consequence of His solidarity with humanity.

Moreover, Christ died for our sins. Death is the ultimate and inevitable fate of man, the logical result of sin. In His radical solidarity with humanity, Christ suffers the maximum penalty for sin and, as God rising from the dead, conquers sin and frees man from the clutches of sin and death. This is the most extraordinary proof of saving solidarity in love. In temptation and death, Christ acts and empathizes with us the as the psychiatrist did with his helpless patient. In this perspective, the temptation of the Holy One, Son of God, is less baffling. For love does such things. And Jesus is God and God is love.

God is faithful to his covenant - - His friendship - with us even to the point of being tempted and dying. The Eucharist is the renewal of the faithful-love relationship of God, of Jesus, with us. This Lent, what response do we make to the radical love of the Tremendous Lover? As long as we live in this world, we cannot be without tribulation and temptation. As written in Job, "The life of man on earth is a temptation" (Job 7:11). Therefore ought every one to be concerned about temptations and to watch in prayer, lest the Devil, who never sleeps, but goes about seeking whom he may devour" (1 Pet. 5:8), find an opportunity to deceive him.

No man is so perfect and holy not to have temptations, and we cannot be wholly free from them. Yet temptations are often very profitable to a man, although they are troublesome and dangerous for with them, a person is humbled, purified, and instructed. All the saints have passed through many temptations and tribulations and have profited by them. Amen.

FIRST READING






LIVE THE LITURGY



Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/ Letters of Eligibility

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

A sponsor must be registered at St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but now lives elsewhere</u>, he/she is not a member of this <u>parish</u>. Rather, he/she is a member of the <u>parish in whose territory he/she resides</u>. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.


