FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

St. Matthew tells us the story of how some wise men arrive in Jerusalem asking where they can find the newborn king whose star they have followed from the east. The old-born king, Herod, is not exactly delighted at the news, perhaps because he fears his own star may lose its place in the firmament in the light of the new competition. He calls together the wise men from Jerusalem, who consult the scriptures to find that the leader will emerge from Bethlehem in the land of Judah.

The wise men from the east continue their quest and come to their journey's end in Bethlehem, where the star halts over a house. They enter it and see the child with his mother, Mary. They pay homage to the child, leave their unusual gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, and then quietly return to their own country without reporting to Herod. We wonder what the meaning of the story of the magi is! Matthew describes beautifully in a story of the same truth that Paul affirms in his letter: the truth, the truth that Jesus is for all peoples. The wise men are the Gentiles, non-Jews, like ourselves. We come from all over the world, and we can find Jesus and do him homage, most especially in these unprecedented and challenging times. Jesus is the infant king of the Jews, but he is not the exclusive property of any tribe or nation: he belongs to us all, as we can all belong to him.

He is the journey's end for all who seek the face of God, for all who seek meaning and purpose in their lives. He came not only for the chosen race but for the human race. He is for all of us. In a sense, the wise men are the ancestors of all of us who seek. We are all seekers: we seek love, acceptance, healing, and understanding. And we know that the journey towards wholeness and holiness is a journey without end. We do not have the stars in the sky to guide us, but even the wise men had to stop being stargazers and consult the scriptures to find out where Jesus was. We don't have the stars to guide us, but we do have the scriptures and each other in our journey to God.

To this place, we come here to this Church as seekers hoping to find Jesus again in the word of the scripture and the breaking of the bread. We believe that the scriptures will lead us to him again, and in that, we can commune with him in the breaking of the bread. In the word and the sacrament, we meet Jesus again. And we meet him in each other, in our frailty and brokenness. The Lord is present in each of us here. Amen. May God bless us.


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



LIVE THE LITURGY

Inspiration for the week

Even the slightest flicker of a light helps to properly orient us when we find ourselves in total darkness. Being in darkness can be unsettling and even a bit unnerving. We lose our focus and struggle to find our bearings and achieve balance. On life's journey we may think we are walking in the light but are really lingering in darkness. We do not see the full picture, either because we are distracted, disinterested, or even apprehensive. Sometimes, we even choose to close our eyes when the light is readily available to illuminate our path. Do we really desire to know the truth of who we are? In Jesus Christ, a light has been given to those who dwell in darkness. God's revelation gives us the light to see where we come from, who we are and where we are going. It also tells us that this Good News is not meant for just a privileged few but is intended to go out to all the world. Is this something we want to see?





Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/ Letters of Eligibility

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

A sponsor must be registered at St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but now lives elsewhere</u>, <u>he/she is not a member of this parish</u>. Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in <u>whose territory he/she resides</u>. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.



Wash Your Hands


Wash your hands for at least 20 seconds using soap and water. If you can't wash your hands, use hand sanitizer frequently.




