FROM THE DESK OF THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners.

Interestingly, there are few developments we are doing in the Church despite the pandemic. Printed bulletins are now available as we pick them up in the Narthex. Moving forward, we will provide you with some good news, like having our traditional palms on Palm Sunday, and Lent, Holy Week, and Easter Sunday celebrations. We are blessed as we can continue with our Church's events and activities despite the COVID-19. However, keep in mind that the virus doesn't discriminate, and there's more surge than we can ever imagine. Thus we have to be vigilant with adhering to the directives and protocols. The parish is doing its best to serve and provide you with the services you need, but please continue to cooperate and support us because our top priority is to keep you safe and healthy and away from any illness or trouble due to the virus. Let's keep our fingers crossed and pray fervently that we will get over this crisis.

The Diocese has already sent us some communication in preparation for the Annual Catholic Appeal for 2021. Given the pandemic we are experiencing right now, we won't be surprised that there's a greater need to support and contribute to the project. Let us be aware of the numerous blessings we receive and manifest our gratitude to God by giving back in terms of our monetary contributions as we reach out to the less fortunate and to the people who are experiencing hardships by supporting the programs of the Annual Catholic Appeal. Let us remember that in giving, we receive. The more we give, the more we receive. Let us always keep this in mind.

FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"Perfectly healed! You mean, I am well?" "That is what I mean."

This was a telephone conversation between Mary Johnson and her physician, confirming her healing, which defied medical science. Mary was bedridden for more than three years with TB in both lungs. Three years of physical struggle was a light matter compared to her intense spiritual battle, during which her faith was severely tested, purified, and strengthened. In the process, she learned to believe in the healing power of Jesus.

She learned to believe firmly, yes. But faith is not faith unless one believes blindly without compromise and rationalization, with child-like trust and simplicity. All this had to occur in Mary's case before the above telephone call could come with its good news. When we blindly believe in Jesus, incredible things happen to us.

In today's Gospel, St. Mark shows Jesus as God's goodness in action. Jesus heals a possessed person, a demoniac. In today's world, we are to modern and advanced to believe in miraculous healings. We consider ourselves to be scientifically so enlightened and theologically so emancipated that it goes altogether against the grain to believe in demons, and it gives us intellectual itching even to imagine that the devil could possess human beings! The ghost stories are kid's stuff told by doddering nannies!

As we listen to today's Gospel, we are tempted to think: "This is a clear instance where the Bible requires demythologization. Can the Catholic Church expect a modern and post-modern man, to come of age, and accept her teachings on the Devil?" However difficult it may be for us to believe in such teachings, the answer is clear as crystal. If we are Christians, we should believe in them. Our greatest difficulty in believing in them is our fear that we may become superstitious in doing so. This fear is, in turn, caused by our lack of a real working faith in the resurrection of Christ. For our faith in the healing power of Jesus ultimately is a logical consequence of our faith in the resurrection of Christ. By rising from the dead, Jesus conquered all forms of evil by defeating all agents of evil.

The name that describes Satan is malefactor or evildoer because he is the personification of evil. And Jesus is called the Holy One, the Savior. Whenever Jesus saves us, it is always from the evil one. Do devils exist? Do they influence human beings, and does their influence enslave them? Consequently, can there be genuine cases of deliverance from the Devil?

The late Pope Paul VI says: "What are the greatest needs of the Church today? Do not let our answer surprise you as being over-simple or even superstitious and unreal: one of the greatest needs is defense from that evil which is called the Devil." Therefore, it is contrary to the teaching of the Bible and the Church to refuse to recognize the existence of such a reality. The Devil's question and the influence he can exert on individual persons and communities, whole societies or events, is an essential part of Catholic doctrine, which is given a little attention today. Amen.







Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/ Letters of Eligibility

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

A sponsor must be registered at St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but now lives elsewhere</u>, <u>he/she is not a member of this parish</u>. Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in <u>whose territory he/she resides</u>. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.






