

FROM THE DESK OF THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

The birth of a new baby is a beautiful, fantastic event! Together with their families, the couple prepares for the new life by reading books that would guide and give them important information, visit the doctors, get clothes and baby items together, and tell everyone the big news. Everyone is excited to meet the new bundle of joy.

This is likely how most mothers felt when they learned that a new life is born after carrying the babies in their womb for nine months. It was an incredible experience for them as they believe that the perfection of their womanhood is giving birth to a child, nourishing and nurturing the baby. They say that a mother's duty, task, and responsibility is never done as we know that from facts and experience. The mother's love and care never end, that explains why they always worry and think about their children, so many things like how they are doing with their families, their spouse, their grandchildren, their employment, their relationship with fellow workers, how they manage their lives, etc.

May 9 is Mother's Day, a special day for our beloved mothers. We are going to bless all mothers at all Masses for this particular weekend. Also, we have special envelopes dedicated to our mothers living and deceased. The faithful people of our parish community are praying and offering Mass intentions for our mothers for the whole month of May.

Throughout the whole month of May, we are being reminded of our veneration to the Blessed Mother. To offer her our recognition and honor, we are putting her statue in the sanctuary. During these trying and challenging times, we continue to experience this devastating virus, with many people getting sick and dying, and the result on the economy is distressing. Let us seek the help and intercession of our Mother, Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Our Lady of Hope. She may be able to alleviate the suffering of the victims of this deadly disease, and that we will be able to get back to normal in God's time.

FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Today, in the Gospel reading about the vine, Jesus teaches us a new way to live in a relationship with God. He uses the well-known image of the vine. Jesus is the divine vine we are grafted onto. In an agricultural society, people will understand how to get the best of a vine. To share with you a personal experience during my short trip to Bordeaux, France, back in the late '80s, where the famous Bordeaux wine originated from. If the grapes are to develop so that they can be turned into good wine, they need careful management. The sun, the soil, the water, and the energy of the plant have to be directed to the fruit through the proper pruning. The vine cannot be left on its own, or it will simply produce lots of leaves and poor quality grapes. There is a strong connection between root and branch, leaf and fruit, for they share one life. Cut off from that life, and they eventually wither and die.

The same thing applies as Jesus describes for us the relationship which gives us eternal life. We are one with Him and with each other, sharing the one life, his life, and in this way, we can live with him and, like him, produce the fruits of his love. But, Jesus warns us, the vine cannot be left to its own devices. It needs a vinedresser to manage its growth and encourage its fruitfulness. God is such a vinedresser. God knows us and knows what part of us needs to be cut away and what needs encouragement. We are in partnership with God to produce the best version of ourselves, the best fruit, the best wine.

During this trying and unprecedented time, we have to re-assess and re-evaluate our role. In their attempts to end lockdown and get the economy moving, authorities in the government may give the impression that human beings are simply cogs in the vast economic machine. Is this God's plan and vision? We have learned from the pandemic that human life is precious. It is worth putting the world on hold to preserve life. Those who save lives and help keep life safe are as valuable as those who produce wealth. The cleaners, the ones who care, and those who support our supply chains moving, who were once considered less critical, are now recognized for the vital role they play in our daily lives.

Here is the thing, when we look at our world through the lens of our faith, we see just how interconnected we are. We are all created in the image and likeness of God, who is love. We are designed for love, to love, and to be loved, and this love is not limited, not restricted to our nearest and dearest. We belong together. We need each other, just as the various parts of the vine need to be connected to the entire plant. Roots, stems, branches, leaves, and fruit are all bonded in a purposeful unity. Nonetheless, this is just a tiny example of the entire universe, from the great galaxies and planets to the smallest particles of matter. All have their place, and all work together. As human beings in our little tiny fragment of this entire universe, we have been graced by the Lord God with a particular task and responsibility to manifest the overriding force binding all things together. Hence, if Covid 19 pandemic has taught us this lesson, perhaps it will all have been worth our while. Amen.


LIVE THE LITURGY

Inspiration for the week

Anyone familiar with gardening knows that proper and timely pruning is essential. The health of the plant depends upon it. An unpruned tree can quickly produce suckers that zap many of the essential nutrients from its body. Pruning requires patience and vision. Studies reveal that plants often respond defensively to being pruned, displaying reactions that are similar to hurt or discomfort. Pruning is not easy but necessary. A hard lesson for us to learn is that we also need to be pruned. We become far healthier when we allow God to stretch, refine, and form us into the best version of ourselves. The fruit that then comes from our vines will be more abundant, nutritious, and robust. Left to our own devices we can easily find ourselves running amuck and spiraling out of control. Without a proper vision and trust in the Master Pruner, we will never find the contentment we desperately desire. Nor will the work of the Gospel stand a chance of succeeding.



NJ BISHOPS TRANSFER FEAST OF THE ASCENSION CELEBRATION DATE



The celebration of the Solemn Feast of the **Ascension** of the Lord has been transferred by the bishops of New Jersey from Thursday, May 13, to Sunday, May 16, 2021, for this year only.

The **Ascension** of the Lord occurred 40 days after Easter, when Jesus, in the sight of his Apostles, ascended bodily into heaven to sit at the right hand of his father.

The **Ascension** is narrated in Mark 16:19 and in the first chapter of the Acts of the Apostles, which has a detailed account of Jesus' farewell to his apostles.



Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/ Letters of Eligibility

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

A sponsor must be registered at St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but now lives elsewhere</u>, <u>he/she is not a member of this parish.</u> Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in <u>whose territory he/she resides</u>. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.




