FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

It took me a little bit of time to concentrate and focus on my writing in the Parish Bulletin, as I must admit that I was genuinely affected by the passing of my dearest one and only mother. Please allow me to say something about her as she was an effective instrument of God's magnificent creation as she has given birth to my six other siblings. She was born March 13, 1931, in the Philippines from humble beginnings. She lived life to the fullest as she had many learning experiences about how to live the beauty and goodness of life no matter what the roadblocks areas she had tremendous faith and trust in God. I must admit that my parents are the effective vessels of my calling to the priesthood, especially my mother. She wouldn't ask too much about my vocation while I was still in the seminary for being a loving mother as she could sense and feel what I am going through. Back in my seminary days, whenever I was not feeling good and seemingly sick, I would ask my Prefect of Discipline or my Rector to allow me to go home and be with my mother, and soon enough, I would feel better and quickly get healed. She would make me some chicken soup with veggies as she knows what kind of food my physical body needs and the tender loving care of a birth mother that would immediately have an impact on my whole system; hence, I would be cured of my physical or psychological illness and eventually be back to my normal life as a student in the seminary.

Due to the pandemic, I could not see her personally when her health started to deteriorate, but thanks to the technology, I would always see and speak to her online. She was bedridden for a while, and I credit my younger sisters, who took good care of her up to her last breath on October 19, 2021. She died through natural causes and did not have a positive result when they administered a Covid test on her. Since I was not able to go home for her funeral in the Philippines, the parish will have a Memorial Mass on her behalf on November 12 at 4 P.M. in the Church. We apologize for the limited invitation as we are not out of the woods yet, and we have to abide by the health protocols.

On behalf of my entire family, allow me to express my heartfelt thanks and utmost gratitude for the expression of sympathies, condolences, thoughts, and prayers during the difficult times because of our loss. Let us continue to pray for the eternal and happy repose of the His daughter, Consolacion, and may the Heavenly Light of the Father shine upon her as she is welcomed into His Kingdom, Amen.

THIRTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN THE ORDINARY TIME

The woman's gesture in the Gospel is one of the loveliest and most touching scenes in the whole of the Bible. Here comes a woman, a poor widow, insignificant in herself, she is lost in the big crowd. Her situation is all the more pathetic as she is among many rich and pompous people keen on making a show of themselves, bent on exhibiting their wealth, eager to practice their virtues in public.

In clear contrast, all blatant ostentation comes along with humility our poor widow and gently drops in two coins. A miserable mite! But someone with a better yardstick of values evaluates it differently and makes a solemn declaration: "Truly, I say to you, this poor widow has put in more than all the others . . . "

Do we wonder what makes her small contribution so great? It is the heart that makes the difference. The rich who gave fat contributions did not give up anything, as their gifts were superfluous and attached strings. This woman gave up all that she had with no strings. Her heart was in her gift, while in the gifts of the rich was their ego, not their hearts.

In a generous gift, cheerfully given, a person reveals his superiority over material clay from which we are all formed. In a gift, the spirit of man asserts its freedom from matter; the spirit is neither suppressed under nor shackled by the weight of the matter. In its spirit plays leisurely, sings joyfully, and soars freely. In a free gift, the soul smiles radiantly.

Look at this woman with wrinkled skin over a worn-out frame, materially of little value and weight. And watch the milling opulent and affluent crowd who vie with one another to parade their pride in the temple, house of prayer, and worship! True worship is in spirit and truth. Themselves vulgar, with their rude behavior, they desecrate the temple. The spirit of them is crushed, crabbed, and caged. They are walking corpses; how can they worship in spirit and truth?

On the other hand, this woman, thin and emaciated, is a triumph and temple of the spirit. While her body fasts, her spirit feasts. Her small contribution is a beautiful act of religion, prayer, petition, thanksgiving, praise, and adoration. This is a concrete expression of her faith, hope, and love. She is the living and lively illustration of the first beatitude. Only the poor can receive the good news, and only they will be happy.

We have to keep in mind that every gift is a self-gift. In it, the spirit of man reaches out to another in love to share and care. Of all the gifts, the best gift is a self-gift to God, the highest expressions of religion and morality, liturgy, and worship. The Holy Eucharist is a self-gift: form God to man, man to God, man to man, and all creation.

Here is an excellent thought to think about from someone: "We are rich only through what we give, and poor only through what we refuse to give." Amen.

Saint of the Week

You may recognize the name St. Frances Xavier Cabrini (1850 – 1917) as the first United States citizen to become a saint. Known for her deep trust in God, she was a courageous woman doing the work of Christ.

NOVEMBER 13 CIPI

Her life of service began when she was first refused admission to the religious order which had educated her to be a teacher. Not one to take things face value, she instead focused her charitable work at the House of Providence Orphanage in Cadogno, Italy, and in 1877, professed vows there and took the religious habit.

When the bishop closed the orphanage in 1880, he named St. Frances Xavier Cabrini prioress of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart. However, she had a dream she was determined to fulfill. Since her early childhood, she had dreamed of being a missionary in China. Pope Leo XIII, however, urged her to see the need in the west. She traveled with six of her fellow religious sisters to New York City, where they worked with the thousands of Italian immigrants residing there.

Although she experienced many disappointments during this time, she persevered. When she arrived in New York, the house intended to be her first orphanage in the United States was not available. Rather than come back to Italy and the order she oversaw, she instead found a way to establish that orphanage elsewhere — plus a few more. Throughout her life, she is known for founding 67 institutions dedicated to caring for the poor, the abandoned, the uneducated, and the sick. She died of malaria in her own Columbus Hospital in Chicago in 1917.



Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/ Letters of Eligibility

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

A sponsor must be registered at St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but now</u> <u>lives elsewhere, he/she is not a member of this</u> <u>parish. Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in</u> <u>whose territory he/she resides</u>. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.


