

People are going back to work accordingly. Parish life has to continue as we abide by the health protocols provided to us. TWENTY THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Today's readings offer us some thoughts that are so relevant to our day-to-day lives as we have the interest and desire to live our Christian faith as Lord God has called us.

In the readings, the riches of the kingdom of heaven are offered to those who are poor, deaf, and blind, who are chosen to remind us that God does not have a preference of those poor by the world's standards. culture, class, or race. We might say, and it is easy for us to say that God only views us through one lens, the lens of the heart. We are being asked to look beyond external appearances and see the holiness and beauty within the heart of others. It is not always evident at first sight, but we are called to look through God's lens, God's eyes. In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah speaks of a time of joy to come, when "the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unsealed" and the tongues of those without words will "sing for joy." It would seem that the Lord is offering Father Angelito everything to those who, having little or nothing in this world, still cling to the faith and hope; to these, the prophet proclaims the words of God, "Courage! Do not be afraid... your God ... is coming to save you."

In today's second reading, it is apparent that St. James does not feel that faith in Christ Jesus is compatible with making distinctions between classes of people. We are offered an obvious example of preferential treatment being given to a rich man, while a poor man is ignored, left to "stand over there" or to "sit on the floor." Our partiality may not be as evident, though it can just be as authentic. We are reminded that those who are poor by the standards of our world whom God chooses to be rich in faith and to be beneficiaries of God's kingdom.

as being outside the love and care of the God of Israel. Jesus chooses to open the ears and give back the voice to a deaf man who has an impediment in his speech. Jesus is showing his love for this man, an outsider in the Jewish society of his day, by touching his ears and tongue. Jesus is giving this man back his dignity as a beloved child of God, his Father. The man has faith, as Jesus can cure him. We know from other healing stories in the Gospels that faith and trust would seem to be hallmarks of those chosen by God,

As we reflect on these readings, our minds and hearts offer us the opportunity to open our ears to God's call to have courage, to open our eyes to the living presence of God in all people; and to open our hearts to respect the inner beauty in every human soul. And from our hearts without borders and walls, we will then be able to offer and give the unconditional love of God to all we meet. Amen.





Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/ Letters of Eligibility

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

A sponsor must be registered at St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but now</u> <u>lives elsewhere, he/she is not a member of this</u> <u>parish. Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in</u> <u>whose territory he/she resides</u>. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.

Low Gluten Host

By practicing each week with the Workbook, I get a greater understanding of what the reading is about, how to pronounce certain words, when to pause. These are the mechanicals of reading. More importantly, the real purpose of reading is hopefully that when I proclaim Gods word the stories come alive for the congregation and they can see the situations are the same now as they were long ago and how God continues to guide us through these human failings. It's my prayer each week that the congregation, through the proclaiming of Scripture, experiences an increase of their faith and opens their hearts more fully to the Lord.

All readers are carefully trained in one session. The commitment can be as little as once a month or every week depending on your schedule.


