

Dear Friends in Christ,

TWENTY-EIGHT SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The sincere gratitude of Naaman towards God and his prophet Elisha brought him a gift far more precious than the healing of his leprosy. He received faith in God and was determined to serve him faithfully. Obedience to the prophet healed him, and his faith in God brought him healing of his sins as well. Humility obtained for him the cure of his skin disease. Gratitude to God obtained for him a far greater grace: faith in the true God. Jesus was pleased to see one of those lepers, the Samaritan, coming back to him, praising God for the favor received. It pained him that the other nine had not come back to do the same. He certainly expected them back, not because he wanted to receive their gratitude but to enable him to complete his work of love, of which their healing was only the first step, that is, to bring them to faith.

We must not fail to notice that Jesus did not withdraw his favor from the other nine. They must have happily returned to their village after the priest issued a certificate confirming their cure. But little did they think of the greater blessings they missed on account of their ingratitude.

Eucharist means 'thanksgiving'. When we come to take part in the Eucharist, we do what Naaman and the Samaritan leper did: give praise and thanks to God. We do not want our thanks bottled up inside us. A prisoner cannot go free, and God's words cannot be chained up. But our response to it can if we are not careful. Let our thanks find joyful expression in this Eucharist. And perhaps we could all surprise someone this week by sending a long overdue 'Thank you' note. An unreflective heart is an unappreciative heart; an unappreciative heart is an ungrateful heart; an ungrateful heart is a wretched, sick heart.

All of us have a big ego, which like a clock, day by day, clicks on, "I want...I need...I want... I need." Our ego can become so demanding that it can make endless claims and multiply needs. Hence, it is part of self-discipline to check on our ego's demands and teach it to be reflective, consider the blessings it has received, enjoy them, and be grateful for them.

Gratitude is the attitude of a sensitive soul appreciative of its gifts. It is the sign of a good heart which, while it enjoys the gifts, is not forgetful of the giver of gifts. The nine ungrateful lepers in today's Gospel were so wrapped up in themselves and engrossed with their received blessings that they forgot their benefactor and saddened him.

A grateful heart is a humble heart; a humble heart is a religious heart; a religious heart is a reverential heart; a reverential heart is a liturgical heart; a liturgical heart is a praising heart, and such a heart cannot but be joyful and healthy.

Lord, may my life be a joyful hymn of praise and thanksgiving. Amen.






SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint John XIII was born Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli on November 25, 1881, in a small village in Italy. He was ordained in 1904 and later earned a doctorate in canon law. During World War I he served as a stretcher-bearer and chaplain for the Italian army. Beginning in 1925 he served as a Vatican diplomat, first in Bulgaria, then in Greece and Turkey. From 1935 through the Second World War he helped save thousands of Jewish people. In 1944 he was named papal nuncio to France. He was named cardinal and appointed patriarch of Venice in 1953. A quiet pastoral life passing into retirement, however, was not in God's plan for the saint.

Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli was elected Pope in 1958 and took the name John. His papacy was short, but full of action. He transformed the Vatican, calling for openness, a spirit of ecumenism, and the setting aside of politics. He called the Second Vatican Council in the fall of 1962, the first meeting of its kind in almost a century, setting the agenda to work for the spiritual regeneration of the Church. His efforts changed the face of the Catholic Church. At the same time worked diligently and publicly to ease tensions during the Cuban missile crisis, pleading with leaders for the end of the Cold War.

Saint John XXIII's kindness, sense of pastoral care, and works of reconciliation and peacemaking made him beloved not only to Catholics but to people around the world. He died on June 3, 1963. He was beatified in 2000 by St. John Paul II, and canonized by Pope Francis in 2014.

Liturgical Life



WHAT IS IT ? WHAT IS THE NATIONAL EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL?

The National Eucharistic Revival is a threeyear initiative sponsored by the Bishops of the United States to inspire & prepare the People of God to be formed, healed, concerted, united & sent out to a hurting & hungry world through a renewed encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist – the source & summit of our Catholic faith.

The revival has officially begun in June 2022, & its milestone event will be a National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, Indiana, from July 17-21, 2024. The National Eucharistic Congress are a direct response to the Holy Father's call for a "pastoral & missionary conversion which cannot leave things as they presently are "so that the Church in the United States might be "permanently in a state of mission." (*Evangelii Gaudium*, n.25)

This Eucharist movement seeks to bring together clergy, religious laity, apostolates, movements, and parish and diocesan leaders to spur momentum, collaboration, & lasting impact for the renewal of the Catholic Church in the U.S. over the next three years. Each year will have strategic focus for formation & missionary discipleship.

WHAT HAPPENED SO FAR? THE FEAST OF CORPUS CHRISTI

On June 19, 2022, we launched a national response to the Lord's call with widespread Eucharistic processions & adoration on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.

WHAT IS NEXT?

YEAR OF DIOCESAN REVIVAL 2022-2023

This first year of the Revival invites diocesan staff, bishops, & priests to respond to the Lord's personal invitation & equips them to share this love with the faithful through Eucharistic congresses & events.

YEAR OF PARISH REVIVAL 2023-2024

The second phase will foster Eucharistic devotion at the parish level, strengthening our liturgical life through faithful celebration of the Mass, Eucharistic Adoration, missions, resources, preaching, & organic movements of the Holy Spirit.

NATIONAL EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS

July 2024

At this historic event, more than 80,000 Catholics of all ages will gather in Indianapolis to reconsecrate their hearts to the source & summit of our faith.

YEAR OF GOING OUT ON MISSION 2024-2025

Having enkindled a missionary fire in the hearts of the faithful, the Holy Spirit will send us out on mission to share the git of our Eucharistic Lord.

SACRAMENT IS AT THE HEART OF WORSHIP SPONSORS FOR THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM AND CONFIRMATION

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/Letters of Eligibility

In St. Catherine's Parish and in all Catholic Parishes in the U.S.

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

For sponsor requests from St. Catherine', you must be registered at

St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request, showing participation in the life & support of the Church.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but now</u> <u>lives elsewhere, he/she is not a member of this</u> <u>parish. Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in</u> <u>whose territory he/she resides</u>. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.

REASONS WHY TO REGISTER IN THE PARISH

Registration is the official way we join a parish community. Some people think that because they attend a particular parish they automatically belong.

Registration is a commitment to community, a way to be included in the religious, social and ministerial activities of the parish. Registration shows you belong. It is also necessary for certain benefits and administrative purposes, like scheduling sacraments, obtaining a Sponsor/ Godparent Certificate and Letter of Eligibility, and donation statements for your income tax returns. Most importantly, it lets the parish count on you, to call on you to assist in its mission.

Registering in the parish is simple. It just requires signing up, formally enrolling yourself by contacting the Parish Office. Young adults 18 and over who are still living at home with their parents, or attend college, are recommended to register in their own name. Thank You.


