### A Message from our Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

#### FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

The story of raising Lazarus is the climax in the series of important signs we find in the Gospel of John. It throws light on the supreme gift of Jesus to all human beings. After having presented Jesus as the fountain of the living water, as the light of the world, as the Good Shepherd, Jesus is now presented before us, with the amazing story of raising Lazarus, as the Resurrection and the Life.

When Lazarus fell sick, Martha and Mary immediately sent word to Jesus, saying: "Lord, he whom you love is ill." After informing Him, with confident loyalty and expectant faith they waited for Jesus. They knew He would certainly come. They knew His nature well. However busy He was, He would not turn away anyone who approached Him for help.

They hoped that, knowing their sore distress, He would put everything aside and rush to help. They kept on waiting and waiting. Those loving hearts were in fact tortured by that futile waiting. Slowly, slowly, the flickering flame of Lazarus' life sank lower and lower and finally went out. To their great dismay, even then Jesus did not come. Oh, not even for the funeral!

At last, He came. When? When everything was over. Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. What would have been our reaction if we were in the place of Martha and Mary? But look at the behavior of Martha! When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him with a mild reproach for his failure to come on time. In the case of Mary, we are told she "got up quickly and went to Him." From her came only that sad, heartrending, wistful, wishful lament, "Lord, if You had been here, my brother would not have died." She knew that Jesus had the power to prevent her brother's death.

Later, that strongly trustful confession of Martha, "And even now I know that whatever You ask from God, God will give you." She knew that Jesus was still capable of doing something about it. What did she mean by that? Did she expect Jesus to raise him from the dead? Probably she herself hardly knew. Yet her attitude was one of total trust in Jesus. She was not sure what she ought to ask Him, or what He would think it right to do. But she was completely sure of His interest in them, and His power to do something that no one else could do for them. In our prayers, do we have such an attitude of trust and self-surrender?

Martha and Mary were deeply aware that Jesus had great love for them and their brother Lazarus. On their part they loved Him perhaps much more than they loved their own brother. Jesus also knew the depth of their love and trust in Him. And then came that august and authoritative declaration of Jesus: "I am the Resurrection and the Life; he who believes in Me, though die, yet shall he live, and whoever lives and believes in Me shall never die."

Brothers and sisters, do we find other statement anywhere in the world so profound, so majestic and mysterious, so unfathomable and incomprehensible? Who will ever succeed in grasping the deep meaning of this statement? Is any human being competent enough to comment on this passage adequately? Martha did not understand all the implications of these words of Jesus. But she believed them. She knew that He was not a liar or out of His mind, but the Lord. She believed. And Lazarus was raised from the dead.

Grant me, Jesus, that I may live, love, die and rise with you. Amen.

#### Live The Liturgy Inspiration of the Week




Joseph Dutton, please intercede for us and present our requests to God through Christ Our Lord.



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

During the days and weeks of penance that lie ahead --- from **Ash Wednesday, February 22, 2023, until Holy Thursday morning, April 6, 2023 ---** the Catholic Church throughout the world commemorates the penitential season of Lent ending with the Sacred Triduum of Holy Week. The model Jesus gave us for "these forty days" was his own experience in the desert and the temptations that followed him there where he encountered Satan face to face. And yet, Jesus, there in the desert --- alone, fasting and in intense prayer --- beat back the devil and triumphed over temptation, as strong and as unrelenting as it was throughout those forty days.

We enter the desert of Lent like Jesus, led by the Holy Spirit, to face our devils, our temptations head on. But we are not alone. The Lord Jesus Christ is with us. And so, too, is the Church, the entire community of faith observing Lent. Here is what the Catholic Church in the United States requires of us as baptized Catholics:

The days of FAST (only one full meal) <u>and</u> ABSTINENCE (no meat) are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. No dispensations are granted on these solemn days except for reason of sickness or those provided in canon law below. ALL OTHER FRIDAYS OF LENT are days of ABSTINENCE.

The pastor of a parish has the faculty to give a dispensation to <u>individual</u> parishioners in his parish and the Diocesan Bishop alone has the authority to dispense groups of Catholics but only for a serious reason.

Those who are automatically dispensed from fast and abstinence regulations outside the age limits noted below include: the physically or mentally ill, especially individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also included in the dispensation are women who are pregnant or nursing. In all cases, common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting.

Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to FAST (only one full meal) as above. From the age of 14, people are also obliged to ABSTAIN (no meat): this obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat).

The obligation to observe the laws of fast and abstinence is a serious one for Catholics. Failure to observe one penitential day in itself is not considered a serious sin. It is the intentional failure to observe any penitential days at all, or a substantial number of penitential days, that must be considered a serious matter.

The obligation, the privilege really, of receiving the Eucharist at least once a year --- often called "Easter duty" --- for those in the state of grace should still be fulfilled during the period from the **First Sunday of Lent, February 25-26, 2023, to Trinity Sunday, June 3-4, 2023.** However, the Church's law does permit this precept to be fulfilled at another time during the year when there is a just cause.

I want to encourage all Catholics, especially those who are conscious of serious sin, to go to confession and to make use of the sacrifices and traditions that have always been part of our Lenten practices in the Church.

We do, indeed, fast and pray with the Lord Jesus and with our fellow Catholics. May this Lent be a time of penance leading to grace and joy for us all at Easter.

### SPONSORSHIP FOR THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM AND CONFIRMATION

The godparents, together with the parents, must be willing to help the baptized grow in love for Christ and neighbor. By word and example, the godparents will encourage the candidate to live the Christian life and fulfill faithfully the obligations connected with it (cf. Code of Canon Law, c. 872-874).

### Requirements to Obtain a Sponsor Certificate/Letters of Eligibility

In St. Catherine's Parish and in all Catholic Parishes in the U.S.

- A sponsor must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Eucharist, & Confirmation and if married, married in the Catholic Church.
- A sponsor must be at least 16 years of age.
- A sponsor attends Mass faithfully participating in the life and support of the Church, receiving the Eucharist, and leading a life according to the teachings of the Church.

#### For sponsor requests from St. Catherine's, you must be registered at St. Catherine of Siena Parish and registered for at least six (6) months prior to the request, showing participation in the life & support of the Church.

Note, if he/she received all his/her sacraments here at St. Catherine of Siena Parish years ago <u>but</u> <u>now lives elsewhere, he/she is not a member of</u> <u>this parish.</u>

Rather, he/she is a member of the parish in whose territory he/she resides. This is where the sponsor certificate must be obtained.




